### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

### A. INTERPRETATION

- 1. The Crook County Fair Board reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences. Matters concerning 4-H or FFA Rules and Regulations will be handled by the 4-H Educator or FFA Advisors, respectively.
- 2. In the event of conflict of General and Special Rule, the latter will govern. Any person who violates any of the following or Special Rules published in this Fair Premium Book will forfeit all premiums and may be subject to such penalty as ordered by the Crook County Commissioners.
- 3. The Board reserves the right to amend, or add to these rules, as they in their judgment may deem advisable.

### B. CONDUCT

1. If any participant, parent or spectator at the Crook Co. Fair interferes with or is disrespectful to any judge, superintendent, Fair Board member, office staff or anyone else who is a fair official, the participant may be excused from the ring, or exhibit hall, excluded from further competition and any premiums that have been awarded may be withheld. The individual(s) may be dismissed from the Fairgrounds.

### C. LIABILITY

1. The Crook County Fair Board, Crook County Commissioners and Crook County will assume no liability for injury, loss or damage sustained by persons, property or livestock of any exhibitors, concessionaires or spectators. Every animal and article upon the grounds shall be under the control of the Fair Board, and every precaution will be exercised for the safety and wellbeing of the same.

### **D. ENTRIES**

1. Exhibitors can submit entries (with some exceptions) via free online entries at <a href="https://www.crookcofair.com">www.crookcofair.com</a>. Efforts will be made to distribute the Fair Book throughout the county. Exhibitors should keep a copy of their online entries for their records.

# 2. PRE-ENTRY IS REQUIRED FOR 4-H, FFA AND OPEN CLASS EXHIBITS!

- 3. The Board reserves the right to reject unworthy entries of any nature by refusing them exhibit space.
- 4. Youth may enter the Youth Livestock Show between the ages of 8 until the age of 21. Youth may only sell livestock in the Youth Livestock Sale if the exhibitor is between the ages of 8 and until the fair following their high school graduation.
- 5. All livestock entered and exhibited at the Fair shall be inspected and passed on for soundness and condition by the superintendent or local vet before being eligible to be exhibited. All animals found to be inferior must be removed from the Fairgrounds immediately.
- 6. All sheep and goats that are brought to Fair must be scrapies tagged.
- 7. Any entries, which have been inadvertently or erroneously entered, may, at the discretion of the Fair Board, the Department Superintendent or Judge, be transferred to the proper class prior to the judging.
- 8. See respective Department rules for number of entries allowed in each class.

- 9. The same animal cannot be entered in the Youth Livestock Show and then again in Open Class except in the case of Futurity Classes.
- 10. In all cases where registration is required, each exhibitor shall furnish the registration number and name under which animal is registered on the entry form.
- 11. Should any individual enter either any animal or article in the name of other than that of the bona fide owner, or attempt to perpetrate a fraud by misrepresentation of any fact, the entry thus made must be removed from exhibition.
- 12. In all cases where registration is required, all animals exhibited all purebred animals must be registered on the record as the various breed association of classes listed herein.
- 13. Partnership owned animals must be entered in the name of the owner appearing on the herd books of registry. Original registration or a copy must accompany livestock and be available for presentation upon request.
- 14. Animals shown in all group classes must have been entered and shown in their respective individual classes.

### E. EXHIBITORS

- 1. Exhibitor parking areas will be provided. Parking of vehicles, trailers, and campers to be in the respective designated areas only. Violators will be towed at owner's expense. No unauthorized plug-ins or camper plugins to the barns is permitted.
- 2. Exhibitors will be required to keep their stalls, pens, alleys and any outside area used daily in a clean and attractive condition.
- 3. Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding, watering and cleaning up after his/her livestock through the end of fair.

- Exhibitor is responsible for wetting down their own pen as necessary.
- 4. Bedding and litter shall be disposed of in designated areas.
- 5. Exhibitors will cooperate at all times to conduct the best possible fair. Un-sportsman like conduct will not be tolerated and the offending exhibitor will forfeit all premiums due and may be immediately dismissed from the Fairgrounds.

### F. PETS and BICYCLES-NEW!

- 1. For the safety of our exhibitors, livestock and exhibits, NO DOGS (excluding service animals) or bicycles will be allowed in any area where exhibits or animals are housed, including barns, tie-outs, shade structure, and the static exhibit building. This also includes areas of outside shows such as the cat, dog, and horse shows, and the livestock show ring.
- 2. If a pet is brought to the fair, it MUST be kept on a leash at all times and is not allowed to run loose.
- 3. Dogs are allowed in the camping area, but must be kept on a leash, and shall not be allowed to bark or disturb other campers, exhibitors, staff, volunteers, the public, etc. Anyone having a dog in the campground MUST clean up after the dog. Dogs are the only animals allowed in the campground-no other animals are allowed.
- 4. Owners or handlers shall be responsible for clean-up of the animal's excrement, vomit, etc. Pet owners and handlers are responsible for the control of noise or any damages caused by the pet.
- 5. Fair management reserves the right to have any loose pet removed from the fairgrounds at the owner's

expense. They also reserve the right to ask any exhibitor, parent, spectator, etc, to leave the fairgrounds if the rules are not followed.

### G. RELEASE TIME

- 1. Release time for all non-sale/breeding animals will be 5:00 P.M. on Friday. No market animals will be released until the conclusion of all paperwork at the end of the sale on Saturday.
- 2. Release time for all static exhibits will be 4:30 PM on Saturday. No static exhibits are to be removed before this time or premiums will be forfeited.

# H. CONCESSIONS & COMMERCIAL EXHIBITORS

- 1. All persons making application for concessions will be required to sign a written contract before being allowed to transact any business. The Board reserves the right to cancel at any time, for reasons satisfactory to itself, all contracts made with the concessionaires or others.
- 2. The Board will use every precaution to guard against extortion in any form practiced upon the patrons of the Fair. Any extortion practiced by a concessionaire will cause the forfeiture of contract money paid or expulsion from the grounds, or both, as the Board may direct. The Board will consider it a great favor if visitors will report any mistreatment or extortion from a concessionaire. Do not wait until the Fair is over to file a complaint; do it immediately
- 3. All ground leases or space contracts, unless otherwise specified, will expire with the close of the Fair each year, and all temporary buildings, frames, booths, etc., must be removed prior to August

- 10, following; otherwise, they will become the property of the Crook County Fair.
- 4. Concessionaires must keep their spaces in a sanitary condition by removing any filth and refuse, placing the same in garbage containers as specified by the Fair Board.
- 5. Concessionaires must not throw any refuse or empty any water or other fluids on the grounds or in the streets. The first violation of this rule may cause the concession to be closed and forfeiture of all fees paid.
- 6. Concessionaires and their help must be neat and tidy in their dress. Persons found working at any concession not complying with this rule may be ordered off the grounds.

### I. CAMPGROUND

- 1. All campground users who require an electrical hookup will pay a \$15 fee per campsite during fair week. Paid campsites can begin moving in on the Monday of fair week. Free tent camping will open on Superintendent Workday.
- 2. Camp Trailers, motor homes and vehicles are allowed in designated parking areas only.
- 3. Camping rules will be posted at the campground and will be enforced. No unauthorized plug-ins to the barns are permitted.
- 4. All campground users must keep their space litter free and in a sanitary condition. Rowdiness, profanity or vandalism will not be tolerated. The Fair Board and their appointed representatives reserve the right to dismiss any offender immediately for reasons satisfactory to themselves.

### J. VEHICLES

1. All vehicles operated on the Fairgrounds must be operated safely,

quietly and obey all traffic and parking regulations.

- 2. Speed limit for all vehicles is 5 mph.
- 3. Drivers and or vehicles committing moving violations are subject to fine and dismissal from the grounds.
- 4. Vehicles violating parking rules will be towed at the owner's expense.

### K. SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. Each Superintendent will have charge of the department assigned to him/her, subject to the orders of the Fair Board.
- 2. The Superintendents shall meet at the Fair Office when requested to do so.
- 3. Superintendents will have charge of the stalls or display spaces in his/her department. Rearrangement of stalls and spaces will be under his/her supervision.
- 4. It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to inform the Judges of his/her department of the rules and regulations governing awards and to urge them to read the rules carefully before beginning judging. Superintendents will meet with the Judge ½ hour before judging begins to go over judging rules and regulations!
- 5. Each Superintendent is charged with caring for and posting the judge's books of his/her department. They must see that all awards are duly and properly entered therein, as it is only upon this record that the premiums can be paid. Each sheet must be signed by the Judge immediately after judging.
- 6. It is the responsibility of the Superintendent to insure that the Judge's Book is accurate and contains all required information.
- 7. Original judge's books must be returned to the Fair Office. Results of judging must be immediately reported to

- the computer and media centers in the Fair Office.
- 8. Superintendents shall make sure their areas are cleaned and all exhibits are removed from Fairgrounds
- 9. Superintendents and the Fair board have the authority to withhold premium money from an exhibitor who violates rules set forth in the premium book.

### L. JUDGING

- 1. No exhibitor or spectator will be allowed to interfere with a judge in the performance of his duties as every effort was expended to provide competent judges.
- 2. Exhibitors must arrange for the prompt showing of all exhibits at the call of the judge. At the judge's discretion any exhibit not presented promptly when called may be disqualified.
- 3. Premiums will be awarded to exhibitors whether or not there is competition, and judge will determine which placing each exhibit should receive. The decision of the judge shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in cases of a formal protest.
- 4. Objection to any person serving as a judge must be submitted to the Fair Board in writing prior to his making an award; giving good and sufficient reason therefore, and upon which the Board shall have the full power to act.

### M. PROTESTS

- 1. All protests will be addressed following Article C of the Crook County Fair Board's Policies and Procedures. Copies may be obtained from the Fair Office or website.
- 2. No protest will be accepted without \$50.00 cash or check and a written complaint signed by the exhibitor.
- 3. The protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and

must be delivered to the Fair Office and Class Superintendent immediately after the occasion for the protest.

- 4. A protest pertaining to eligibility is most suitable when submitted prior to judging. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation.
- 5. Depending on the basis of the protest, interested parties may be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence. A decision may be withheld until a complete investigation can be made.
- 6. All protest fees will be given to the Crook County Fair Awards Committee.
- 7. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an entry will be considered.

### N. PREMIUMS

1. No animal shall compete for or receive more than one premium except in group classes or performance classes.

- 2. All premiums and ribbons will be awarded in the Static Exhibits-Open Class, 4-H & FFA-using the Danish System, whereby each entry is judged on its own merits, rather than judged against other entries.
- 3. Each exhibit will be paid one premium only.
- 4. If there isn't a Blue or 1st place in the class then there will not be a class champion. Only Blue (1st) or Purple ribbons are eligible to receive Champion rosettes and premiums.
- 5. Premium checks will be mailed within 30 days after fair has concluded.
- 6. Premium checks will only be honored for 90 days after the date written. Any checks not picked up or cashed will be forfeited after 90 days.

### History of the Sheep Futurity

The Crook County Fair Sheep Futurity was established in the 1980's by area sheep rancher, Annie Fish. It was designed to promote and encourage sheep production in Crook County. The futurity is a 3-year long contest intended to showcase a producer's sheep program by allowing them to show a ewe lamb the first year, bring her back as a yearling ewe the next year, and finally show her the third year with her lamb/lambs at her side. The futurity is a perpetual contest since the 3-year cycle begins every year.

The futurity was renamed in her honor as the "Annie Fish Memorial Sheep Futurity" upon her passing in 2002.

ADVANCED AMATEUR refers to those who have exhibited and won prizes in accredited or recognized show; or who have had under three years of school training. AMATEUR refers to those who have not previously won prizes and do not derive income directly from visual art. The amateur generally does this for pleasure and has had little or no training. JUNIOR refers to those who have not reached their 19th birthday before the FIRST day of fair. CHILDREN refers to those who have not reached their 11th birthday before the FIRST day of fair. Those entering in the children and junior classes must state their age on the entry form and exhibit tags.
- 5. Signatures or names on articles to be judged should be covered until after the judging.
- 6. You may enter each class more than once as long as each item you enter is distinctly different (i.e. landscape, animals, western scene, still life, abstract or portrait). Children (age 10 and under) are limited to one pastel, one chalk, one crayon, one pencil, one charcoal, one pen & ink and one mixed technique drawing entry in Class 3. Any article not eligible for competition will be accepted for display only.

# CULINARY DEPARTMENT C

### Superintendent.....Tally Hughes

- 1. Only the products of the "Home Kitchen" are eligible. Exhibitors offering borrowed, or purchased articles as their handiwork will forfeit all rights to participate in premium awards.
- 2. Exhibitors may enter each class more than once as long as each item is distinctly different.
- 3. Items entered should be made since fair of the previous year.
- Place all baked goods on small disposable paper or plastic plates and seal in a Ziploc® bag.
- 5. All baked goods must be thawed before judging.
- 6. Canned foods and jellies exhibited in dirty jars will be disqualified.
- 7. Judges will open jellies, jams, and conserves; other jars may be opened if placings are close. Jars with fruit emblems must have fruit emblem lids.
- 8. All vegetables (except tomatoes), fruits and meats must be processed in the pressure

canner. They must be processed in regulation Ball or Kerr jars.

9. Canned goods must be exhibited in regulation canning jars. In order to be judged, all jelly products (jellies, jams, preserves, marmalades, butters) must be processed in a boiling water bath. Paraffin sealed jars will not be judged. Mold spoilage occurs too readily with this method and cannot be judged due to the food safety issue.

### BREADS, CAKES, COOKIES, PIES

Exhibit 1/3 loaf of bread, 3 rolls, 3 doughnuts, 3 muffins, 1/3 cake, 3 cupcakes, 3 cookies. No mixes may be used. Place items on small disposable paper or plastic plates and seal in a Ziploc® bag. All entries should include your recipe.

**Bread:** In order that competition be fair to all exhibitors, loaves of bread must be baked in standard size baking pans 9 ¼" x 5 ¼" x 2 ¾", approximately. Exhibit 1/3 loaf only, please.

Cakes: Sponge, chiffon or angel food cakes should not be frosted. Cakes made with fats or oils may be frosted. Put cakes on covered cardboard about 1 inch larger than cake—not glass plates. No commercially prepared mixes are allowed. Minimum 8-inch pan. 1/3 cake only, please or 3 cupcakes. Include your recipe.

**Cookies:** Each exhibit to consist of 3 cookies. Cookies may be of any variety, including bar cookies. Include your recipe.

**Pies:** No cream, custard, pumpkin or cream cheese filling pies and no frosting on pies. Exhibit whole pie. After pies are judged, one-half may be taken home. Include recipe.

- 2. Canned goods must be exhibited in regulation canning jars. All jelly products (jellies, jams, conserves, marmalades, butters) must be processed in a boiling water bath to be judged. Paraffin sealed jars will not be judged. Mold spoilage occurs too readily with this method and cannot be judged due to the food safety issue.
- 3. Exhibits must contain a label on the jar, not the lid, with the following information: name of product, process method (boiling water or pressure), process time & pounds of pressure, style of pack (raw or hot), and where processed. Label can be obtained on www.crookcofair.com.

# FLORICULTURE & HORTICULTURE DEPARTMENT R

### Superintendent.....Tom Ferrell

- 1. All amateur gardeners are encouraged to enter exhibits in all classes.
- 2. Exhibitors may have more than one entry in any one class as long as each entry is distinctly different (i.e. double mum, pompom mum, single mum, etc.)
- 3. The Superintendent shall have the right to refuse entry of plants or cut flowers which have been grown in a professional or commercial greenhouse, or when determined it has not been cared for by the exhibitor for at least 90 days prior to Fair exhibit. Potted plants are alive, and constantly changing, therefore potted plants are not barred from re-entry if they have been previously exhibited at the Crook County Fair.
- 4. The Fair officials will not be responsible for loss, breakage, or damage to any containers or accessories.
- 5. Select flowers that are coming into full bloom NOT flowers that are already in full bloom. If a flower is to remain fresh throughout the exhibit period, it must be cut no later than the day before it is to be exhibited. It is generally recognized that afternoon. especially cutting in afternoon, when the greatest amount of sugar has ascended into the leaves and blooms - as well as a "hardening off" process will help insure a winning entry. Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or pruning shears and plunged into deep, hot water: 110 degrees Fahrenheit is ideal. It is a good practice to carry a bucket of water to the garden and place each cut specimen in the water at once. Following cutting and hot water treatment, specimens should be placed in a cool, darkened room. After several hours, when the water has come to room temperature, add ice to the water and leave the flower material undisturbed overnight. Flowers prepared in this way improve their substance and will hold their freshness longer.
- 6. The decision of the Superintendents and Judges is final.

### **DIVISION 1 -- FLOWERS AND PLANTS**

- Specimens should have exact number of blooms called for with some of its own foliage attached, be well groomed and correctly labeled.
- All entries must be grown by the exhibitor or owned for at least 3 months prior to the show.
- 3. The superintendents may add additional classes if number of exhibits warrant.
- 4. All cut flower entries will be placed in a clean, unmarked, clear glass container, with no leaves down in the water, if possible.

### VEGETABLES

The following information will aid exhibitors in preparing the exhibits.

**ASPARAGUS**—Should be fresh, tender and firm, with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost its entire length, taper uniformity, the same at the butt, and be the same length.

**BEANS**—Green and wax beans should be clean, firm, crisp and free from blemishes.

Long straight pods of the same length and color should be selected. The ends of the pods should not be broken off and their seed should be about one-half grown.

BEETS—Diameter should be 2 to 2 ½ inches. Side rootlets should be removed, but tap root should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Tops trimmed, leaving 1 inch of leaf stalk above crown.

**BROCCOLI**—Each head should be 3 inches in diameter. Stems should be 5 to 6 inches long. Heads should be compact, dark, or purplish green in color, depending on variety. Avoid any yellowing or flowering in heads. This indicates over maturity and lack of quality. Entry must be free from insects, worms, and damage caused by wilting or injury.

**CABBAGE**—Type is very important. Leaves should not be peeled too closely. The heads should be firm, heavy in proportion to size, not withered or soft, free from damage, freezing or disease injury, and the midribs should not be large as that would indicate coarseness. Stems should be cut off.

**CARROTS**—Select carrots that are smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color, and free from greening at top. Specimens should be typical of their variety. Avoid oversize. Should be free from side roots, cracks, and other damage. Cut off tops one inch.

**CAULIFLOWER**—Heads should be pure, white, solid, uniform and close flowered. Should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the green outer leaves to one inch above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain.

**CELERY**—Should be exhibited with root removed and the outside leaves removed until the inside is uniform in color. Avoid split, pithy, woody and stringy stalks. Avoid disease infested leaves. Celery should be washed carefully and all dirt removed. Avoid cutting the roots too closely.

**CUCUMBERS FOR PICKLES**—Avoid oversize and extremes of immaturity and over ripeness. Immature specimens are too spiny. Overripe ones may turn white or yellow. Cucumbers should run 2 to 4 inches in size and should not be washed. Type and color are very important. Do not mix types.

**CUCUMBERS FOR SLICING**—Straight, firm, crisp, and fresh. Color should be green and white, not yellow. Avoid mature seed. A small seed cavity is desirable. Cucumbers may be washed.

**EGG PLANT**—Specimens should be smooth, firm, heavy, but not too large, uniform in shape and size, and free from blemishes, are desired. Select for uniform purple coloring free from bronzing and greening. Wipe off with soft cloth, but do not wash. Trim stems to one inch.

**KALE**—A large, hardy, curly-leafed green. Dark green in color. Leaves should be crisp, clean and free from bruising or crushing.

**KOHLRABI**—Specimens should not be hard, woody or pithy. They should be 3 to 4 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. Clean, but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to one inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.

MUSKMELONS AND CANTALOUPE—Must be fully ripe when exhibited and free from soft spots or discoloration. Pick on "full slip". If several days elapse between picking date and exhibit, may be picked on "half slip" and permitted to ripen, stems attached.

**ONIONS**—All Same variety, uniform in color, shape, and size. Should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes, but should not be less than two inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their thin papery skin in tact. Do not peel so as to give a slick appearance. The tops (necks) should be small and trimmed to one inch.

PARSLEY—Entries must be fresh, bright green and free of dirt. There should be no yellow or discolored leaves. Bunch ½" at butt makes an exhibit. Minimum stem length 4". Overall length 8-10".

**PARSNIPS**—Roots firm, smooth, tapering evenly, small in diameter (1 ½ to 2 ¼ inches) without side roots. Should be light creamy in color, with taproot left on. Trim taproot to one inch.

**PEAS**—Must be green, fresh and well filled pods. Avoid large empty pods, hard berries and discoloration.

**PEPPERS**—True to variety, deep in color, fresh, firm and symmetrical. Sweet peppers

should show no red color. Pimentos should be red. All peppers should be free from sun scald and injury caused by insects and diseases.

**PUMPKINS FOR PIE**—Specimens should be uniform in color, bright and clean, fresh and fine grained. Free from damage caused by freezing, pithiness, growth cracks, insects, disease or mechanical injury.

**POTATOES**- Four (4) potatoes constitute a sample. Potatoes for exhibit should not be washed.

**RADISHES**—Crisp and tender, medium to large, uniform shape and color. Free from injury caused by disease, insects, growth cracks; or damage while digging or handling. Clean and wash. Exhibit with foliage; avoid pithy specimens.

RHUBARB—Entries should be fresh, firm. Stalks should be fairly thick but not coarse. Leave small portion of leaf (1/2 - 1") to prevent bleeding. Stalks should be pulled, not cut, from crown. Sheath may be removed.

**SQUASH** [Summer]--Stems must be left on. Pick when small, before maturity when the shell is extremely soft. Uniform in size, shape, and color. Be sure samples are free from damage or blemishes. May be washed.

**SQUASH [Winter]**--Select mature specimens with shells hardened. Do not wash. Leave stem attached. Uniform size, shape and color free from damage. Extreme size is no advantage.

**SWEET CORN**—Harvest ears well filled out to tip in the tender juicy stage. Do not pull husk from tips. Allow short shank and husks to remain intact. To peek at the kernels is advisable if the husks will smooth back down unnoticeable. Husks should be fresh and green. Ears should be free from worms, disease or any injury. Ears should be taken to the exhibit in full husk. Strip off one-third of the husks and remove silks before judging.

**TOMATOES, RIPE**—Use only perfect shaped specimens true to type, smooth, free from cracks, sun scald or any blemishes. Should be well colored (no green streaks), ripe but not too ripe. Must be solid. Display with blossom end up. Remove stems.

**TOMATOES, GREEN**—Entries must be uniform in shape and color and be true to type

and variety. They should be free from cracks, insect or mechanical injury, sunscald or blemishes. Show green tomatoes with stems. TURNIPS—Medium sizes are generally desired as having higher quality. Large sizes may be bitter, corky, and pithy; all samples should look alike. Should be clean and bright in color, but not washed. Remove tops one inch above crown. Should be free of damage caused by freezing, pithiness and secondary roots.

**WATERMELON**—Select large, well-formed specimens of the same variety; mature, but not overripe. Free from blemishes or injury such as from sunburn, insects or disease. Wipe off, but do not wash. Leave short stem on melon.

- Entries must be made on the Breeding Animal ID form, as well as online, and delivered to the Fair Office by the deadline stated in the Schedule of Events in the front of this book, along with a first time entry fee of \$5.00
- 2. To enter initially, the heifer must have been calved after January 1 of current year and must be a recorded project.
- 3. The entrance fee will handle bookkeeping and banking fees that may be incurred.
- 4. During check-in at fair, the calf will be identified either by a breed association tattoo or if a commercial calf, a tattoo will be placed in the left ear noting the year the animal was entered. Also any identifying marks will be placed on the official entry form, i.e. black white-face or white spot on belly.
- 5. All animals will be judged and shown in the ring at halter both as a single and as a pair. Animals must be clean, but complete fitting is not mandatory.
- 6. The show judge will place each heifer according to his or her preference. At this time, points will be assigned to each heifer in the following manner:

1st Place	20 Points

Those points will be filed in the Fair Office and be available for viewing.

Four (4) places will be paid in each class. 7. # OPEN CLASS WOOL SHOW DEPARTMENT S

### Superintendent.....Austin Butler

- 1. Last year's fleeces shown at last year's Fair are not eligible for this Fair. Each fleece must represent not more than 12 months growth, except in the case of yearling fleeces, 16 months growth will be allowed.
- 2. QUALIFICATIONS: Any fleece entered in competition shall be discriminated against if: (a) Tied with other than paper twine; (b) Showing any paint or tar brands (soluble branding fluids permissible); (c) Showing excessive dung locks or tags; (d) Discolored by excessive moisture; (e) Cotted; (f) Showing a weak staple or break in fiber; (g) Containing any excess burrs or other vegetable matter.
- 3. PREPARATION OF FLEECES: Spread out the fleece on a clean table or floor, skin side down, taking care not to pull or open fleece as it is handled. The fleece will look like a pelt or hide. At this stage, before rolling or tying, remove all heavy tags, stained wool, and obvious foreign matter. Rolling the fleece takes four easy steps: (1) Begin at one side and loosely fold 8 to 10 inches of edge toward the center of the fleece. (2) Do the same on the other side, but fold toward the center two times -until the twice-folded portion lies on top of the first fold. (3) Fold in the head wool. (4) Roll the entire fleece from the breach toward the shoulder and long side wool. Fleece is now ready to be tied. Using paper fleece twine, wrap it in two directions and tie as you would a package. There should be no loose ends hanging from the fleece. It should be loose enough to make judging easy, yet compact enough to prevent it from falling apart when handled.
- 4. There shall not be more than two entries per class from one exhibitor.



- 4. Articles must have been made within the past year by the Scout and never previously exhibited at the Crook County Fair except for collections which may be exhibited more than once if new additions are made and labeled and dated or in another department. 5. Cookies and candy should include six (6) pieces. All baked goods, candies, & jellies & jams must have a recipe printed on a 5" x 8" recipe card with name, address and phone number on bottom left corner.

### DEPARTMENT H – 4-H

# General Rules and Regulations will be applicable to all 4-H static and livestock exhibits.

- 1. 4-H members must be enrolled in the appropriate project before they can exhibit in the class in the 4-H division.
- 2. Online entries are due by the deadline indicated on the Schedule of Events in the front of this book. It is the responsibility of 4-H youth to verify correct entry of their exhibits with their 4-H educator.
- 3. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care of his or her exhibit at the fair. The Fair and the UW Extension are not responsible for the loss of or damage to any exhibits or animals.
- 4. Interview judging for all static 4-H entries is encouraged. Static exhibits must be brought in when you are interview judged on Tuesday of Fair. If you don't want to interview judge, the exhibit must also be brought in at this time.

A 4-H member will be allowed to do interview judging on two (2) exhibits in each project area. An unlimited number of exhibits may be entered in each project area.

- 5. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGE IS FINAL.
- 6. 4-H exhibits are placed as judged using the Danish System of recognition (purple, blue, red, white). Additional awards or recognition are available pending donor support.
- 7. Exhibits placing with a purple ribbon are eligible to compete at Wyoming State Fair. Consult with County Extension personnel for rules governing what exhibits are eligible to go to Wyoming State Fair.
- 8. SKILLS SUMMARY CARDS: Due to the absence of interview judging at the state fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, and additional help from others.
- 9. All Crook County 4-H members who will attend the Wyoming State Fair and compete,

- exhibit or participate in any 4-H event while there, must abide by the rules and regulations. 10. Posters, pictures, artwork and photography exhibits should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboard. Entries not appropriately prepared for hanging will not be displayed. Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table.
- 11. Any exhibit that puts the safety of others at risk of injury or harm, as deemed by the county 4-H office, may not be allowed to be publicly displayed and/or judged.
- 12. Oversized exhibits will be displayed as space permits.
- 13. All static exhibits will have a permanent identification attached. If the Fair tag can be tied to the project in such a way that it cannot fall off, that will be acceptable. Otherwise, address labels are suggested. If this is not done, the exhibit will not go to state fair.
- 14. Any violations of rules pertaining to member conduct (disorderly conduct, fighting, insubordination, etc.) will result in action taken by the Fair Board and/or 4-H Program Educator or 4-H Leader. Every 4-H member and 4-H adult volunteer signed an agreement outlining behavior expectations while participating as a 4-H member or volunteer. That code of conduct or agreement is in effect. 15. No items may be removed before Saturday of fair at 4:30 PM or premiums will be forfeited.
- 16. Rosette to be awarded to Best of Show Champion and Reserve exhibit in each division 17. If a youth is enrolled in both 4-H and FFA, work done must be different in each.
- Members may carry the same type of project but the exhibit must be different in each. To this end, members may not show the same project type in the Crook County Fair as in another fair.
- 18. ENTRY INFORMATION: The CLASS CODE must include the DEPARTMENT LETTER, the DIVISION NUMBER and the CLASS NUMBER.

# YOUTH CAT SHOW **DIVISION 14**

# Superintendent......Katie Pfeil

All rules and expectations for Junior and 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Cat Show.

1. "Household Pet" cat is a mixed breed or unknown descent.

A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.

- 2. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- 3. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- 4. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- 5. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- 6. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- 7. Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- 8. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts allowed.

### **Health Requirements**

Cats must be accompanied by a current rabies vaccination certificate, stating that the animal has been vaccinated by a veterinarian in accordance with current recommendations of the Compendium of Animal Rabies control as prepared by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarian (NASPHV). It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations.

plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required. Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

# 4H Dog Show Awards & Donors Top Dog Buckle – Crook County Medical Services District

Complete details of the 4-H Dog Show may be found in the "4-H Small Animal Packet" available at your County Extension Office.

- 1. For purposes of classification into Junior (age 8-10), Intermediate (age 11-13) and Senior (14 years of age but not 19) age divisions, all 4-H members' ages are determined as of January 1 of the year of the show.
- 2. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show, and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes. 4-H members carrying the dog project may use co-owned dogs (owned by the immediate family). The member must have sole care, training and showing of that dog for the current 4-H year and have a training contract. Leased dogs are allowed at the state level, only with a training contract.

Ownership: The dog lives in the same residence with the 4-H member and is owned by the 4-H youth or immediate family member (grandparents, mother, father, brother, sister). Co-Ownership: Ownership ID Sheets extends beyond the family with two or more names on the papers to prove co-ownership exists. One of the names on the ID Sheet must be the 4-H youth or an immediate family member.

Dog Training Contract: The 4-H member may enter into an agreement to train someone else's dog in situations that may benefit the member, the dog or both. This arrangement is used for families with the inability to own a dog. The training contract should not be used as a substitute for normal dog ownership. The co-ownership agreement, training contract and dog ID sheets all must be completed and submitted to the state 4-H office before May 1 of the current 4-H year.

- 3. All animal entries of bona fide Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate.
- 4. All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Dogs must not be taken near the stock barns. Once the 4-H dog show is completed, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.
- 5. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- Females in season will be allowed in classes.However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
- 7. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- 8. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- 9. The Superintendent reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- 10. Each dog may only be entered in one class, one jumper's agility class, and one rally class.

## Section 2- Obedience

- 1. A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- 2. The first-year Beginner Novice class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first year Beginner Novice class only once.

- 3. No dog can compete in any one class more than two years in a row. Members advance from On Leash A to Novice A or from On Leash B to Novice B. On Leash B is for the dog or exhibitor with previous experience in the class. An exhibitor who begins in the A group with a dog stays in the A group for each class. The same is true for the B group.
- 4. A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog by these guidelines:
- **a.** Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level.
- **b.** Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- 5. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class, but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back/down to the lower level with the same dog.
- 6. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
- 7. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- 8. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a leash.
- 9. Bait and/or dog toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.
- 11. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

- H-15-4X **Beginner's Novice** (This class is county only and qualifying scores will not move onto the State Fair for this class.) The

exercises include **Heel on Leash** using rally signs, **Figure Eight** heeling on leash, **Sit for exam**, **Sit Stay** dog sits in middle of the ring while handler walks around the perimeter, and **Recall** handler puts dog on a sit stay, removes leash, walks to ring gate and calls the dog to front.

### Section 3 - Conformation

- 1. Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class, if numbers warrant.
- 2. Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member, if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- 3. Classes 12-19 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred both animal parents of the same breed.
- 4. Classes 20 and 21 are for cross-bred dogsparents of different breeds-and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition, and grooming.
- 5. Please see your 4-H educator for the list of breeds that are eligible for each group before entering your dog.

### Section 4 - Agility

- 1. Dogs must be at least one year of age by May  $1^{st}$ .
- 2. All competitors will start at level one. Advancements are allowed after one

- qualifying score to the next level. After three qualifying scores in Level One, Two and Three, advancement to the next level is mandatory. Same day advancement is not allowed from one level to another level.
- 3. State entrants must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- 4. All dogs will be measured and placed in the proper height class before their agility class starts.
- 5. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at the county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class, but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated county 4-H show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 6. Youth with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog under these guidelines:
- **a.** Junior and Intermediate aged 4-H youth may move back/down one level.
- **b.** Senior aged 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- 7. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on a leash.
- 8. Level 1 dogs will run on a leash. Level 2 dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than 6 inches. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from it such as tags.
- 9. Bait is not allowed in agility competition.
- 10. Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.
- 11. A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are

competing in will be established and announced.

12. Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.

See the State 4-H Dog Show Guide for specifics, explanations, and references.

- 1. 4-H member can enter a single dog in only one rally class.
- 2. A dog must advance levels after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once a level is selected for the dog, the member may not drop to a lower level to compete with that dog.
- 3. Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
- 4. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on a leash. Those competing in On Leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
- 5. Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
- 6. No bait (dog teats or toys) is allowed in the ring.

**Classes:** Classes are based on age of the youth and the experience of the dog and include:

**Novice Dog:** A dog competing which has not obtained three qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from another organization.

**Pre-Advanced Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.

**Advanced Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score of at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

**Excellent Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in an

Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE): After receiving three qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level the handler and dog will compete in both Advanced Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advanced an Excellent) to earn ribbons and or prizes. Handler and dog may show at this level indefinitely.

### **GENERAL RULES**

All entries in this department must be from a Crook County High School Agricultural Education Department and must be certified FFA projects. Members and chapters must be in good standing with the State Association.

- 1. Read carefully the General Rules and Regulations of the Crook County Fair. FFA exhibitors and advisors will abide by applicable rules.
- 2. FFA member project entries in Agronomy, Ag Mechanics and Classroom should be made out in the member's name. Member's complete address must be included.
- 3. All FFA chapter Agronomy, Ag mechanics and Classroom entries should be made in the chapter name and chapter address.
- 4. Any FFA member exhibiting at the Crook County Fair will not consume alcoholic beverages or other illicit drugs regardless of age. Any youth identified with liquor or drugs will be sent home and will forfeit all awards and premiums. Any further disciplinary action will be at the discretion of the local school involved.
- 5. Any violations of rules pertaining to member conduct (disorderly conduct, fighting, insubordination, etc.) will result in action taken by the Fair Board and/or FFA Advisor.
- 6. Contestants must exhibit their own animals in showmanship.
- 7. All market animals will be marked for ownership for that species. Beef, sheep and swine will have ear tags and ID papers, rabbits will be tattooed and poultry shall have leg bands.

- 8. All Crook County FFA members must show proof of ownership and have the livestock in their possession (being fed and cared for) by the appropriate dates.
- 9. All FFA students having livestock for show are required to keep alleys clean and stalls orderly at all times. Failure to do so will mean forfeiture of premiums.
- 10. FFA exhibits must remain in place until officially released.
- 11. If a youth is enrolled in both 4-H and FFA, work done must be different in each. Members may carry the same type of project but the exhibit must be different in each. To this end, members may not show the same project type in the Crook County Fair as in another fair.
- 12. ABSOLUTELY NO MISTREATMENT OF ANIMALS WILL BE TOLERATED.

Entry Information: The Class Code must include the Department Letter, the Division Number and the Class Number.

# **DIVISION 1 – AGRICULTURE MECHANICS**

### RULES

- 1. There will be no double entries by an individual.
- 2. Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, evidence of sound planning, number and degree of skills involved, practicality and agricultural usefulness of the entry.
- 3. All entries must be student's work and result from the training program in agriculture mechanics.
- 4. The judges reserve the right to re-enter entries in Classes in order to make up more judgable groups of entries.
- 5. Judges shall give greater consideration to an item built entirely by the student rather than a prefabricated item.
- 6. Entries in Classes 1 through 6 must be mounted on display boards that may be any size less than 2 feet by 4 feet. Display boards may represent several students' work. Points from these Classes will have equal value with other similar classes in judging sweepstakes. Individual items not mounted will not be

judged. Boards not meeting the specifications will be placed below those boards that do.

- 7. All entries must be removed from equipment and placed in proper Class area to be judged. Example: pickup bumpers and stock racks.
- 8. All projects not of quality will not be judged. This will be left to the discretion of the judge. The items must be removed from the display area.
- 9. Only major agriculture mechanics projects pertaining to the handling or producing of crops or livestock or major shop equipment shall be considered for champion or reserve champion Agriculture Mechanics projects.
- 10. Any entries in the Agriculture Mechanics class that are found to have been shown in previous years will disqualify that chapter, for all premiums, for that year in the Agriculture Mechanics Show.



### YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOWS DEPARTMENT J

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. Youth may enter the Youth Livestock Shows between the ages of 8 until the age of 21. Youth may only sell livestock in the Youth Livestock Sale if the exhibitor is between the ages of 8 and until the fair following their high school graduation.
- 2. Youth must be present to show his/her animal and sell in the livestock sale.
- 2. All livestock brought to the Crook County Fair must be health inspected upon arrival by the presiding veterinarian and respective superintendent. Any animal in poor health will be dismissed from the Fairgrounds.
- 3. All Livestock entered at the fair shall be subject to being inspected and passed on for soundness and condition by a sifting committee before being eligible to be exhibited. All animals found to be inferior must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.
- 4. Swine will be inspected before unloading. All swine must be washed before they come to the fairgrounds and for weigh-in. This includes ear tags. Any swine not meeting this requirement will not be weighed.
- 5. All livestock exhibited in the Youth Livestock Show must be recorded as a Crook County FFA or 4-H Project.
- 6. No participant will be allowed to show and/or sell in the Crook County Fair Youth Livestock Sale plus show and/or sell the same or another animal in another county's fair in either 4-H or FFA, even if they are Grand or Reserve Champion. If a youth is enrolled in both 4-H and FFA, work done must be different in each. Members may carry the same type of project but the exhibit must be different in each. To this end, members may not show the same project type in the Crook County Fair as in another fair. If this rule is not followed, it could potentially risk the youth's ability to compete at the Crook County Fair in the

following years.

- Neck ropes are mandatory for all cattle.
   All livestock will be assigned a stall or tieout. Any change in stalling must be approved by the Superintendent.
- 9. ONLY EXHIBITORS, JUDGES,
  SUPERINTENDENTS CLERKS AND RING
  STEWARDS ARE ALLOWED IN THE SHOW
  RING. In case of exhibitor sickness or
  other emergency, an animal may be
  shown by a substitute exhibitor, providing
  the substitute is a bona-fide Crook County
  4-H or FFA member and the show
  superintendent grants permission in
  writing and is recorded in advance of the
  show for an animal class.
- 10. All cattle must be tied securely in the barn or outside with halter.
- 11. Exhibitors must be dressed in clean, full-length pants, long sleeved shirts, and boots or leather shoes. No tennis shoes or sandals. No headgear is allowed except for those showing horses. FFA members will follow the FFA dress code as set by their advisors. Dress codes will be strictly enforced by the Superintendents. Participants in the dog show may follow the dress code according to that section.
- 12. Youth Animal Care/Fitting Policy: Youth exhibitors must accompany, care for and exhibit their own livestock. A youth member is expected to take care of and groom/fit their own animal. However, in the interest of safety and education, a youth member may be assisted by another bona-fide Crook County 4-H or FFA member.

Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person doing the assisting is teaching the youth member a technique in fitting or showing. This person is allowed <u>only to show</u> the youth member the proper skill or techniques, and the youth member is expected to perform the majority of each technique/skill required.

Violations of this rule must be reported to the Show Committee before the animal enters the ring. A decision by the Show Committee will be made before

the animal is allowed to enter the ring.

If a youth member is found to be in violation of the fitting policy, he or she may be disqualified from competition in any youth division at the Crook County Fair, including showmanship contests.

- 13. Each exhibitor is responsible for cleaning his/her own stall and any outside area used daily and for feeding and watering his\her livestock through the end of the fair.
- 14. All 4-H and FFA members are required to show proof of ownership and must have livestock in their possession, (being fed and cared for) by the appropriate following dates:

  Beef (except feeder calves) February 1, Dogs May 1, and all other livestock June 1. No deadline for horses.
- 15. ENTRY INFORMATION: The Class Code must include the Department Letter, the Division Number and the Class Number.
- 16. A buyer must make arrangements BEFORE the sale if there are extenuating circumstances that require the seller to take the sale animals home after the Crook County Fair.
- 17. A seller can only sell in the youth sale until the summer after their high school graduation.
- 18. Sheep, pigs, and goats will be sold by the head. Beef will be sold by the pound. Meat pens of 3 rabbits/poultry count as one animal.
- 19. No sale animal will leave the premises until the conclusion of the sale and all paperwork is completed.

### **RATE OF GAIN CONTEST**

Rate of Gain Award & Donor \*Champion Buckle – Cross 2 Ranches

A rate of gain contest will be held for Market Beef, Lambs and Hogs and will be open to all Crook County 4-H and FFA members. Market Beef, Market Lambs, Market Goats, and Market Hogs enter contest by weighing their animal at the designated weigh-ins.

A separate class may be needed for this contest, if so it will be left up to the Superintendent on how he/she wants to set the class.

THE CROOK COUNTY SUPREME MARKET ANIMAL AWARD WILL BE GIVEN PRIOR TO THE SALE.

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- 1. Champion Senior Showmanship winners from 4-H and FFA Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep, Horse, and Goat, classes are eligible to enter this contest. If Grand Champion does not want to participate, then Reserve Champion is eligible, and then third, but must have shown in Senior Class.
- 2. Showmanship contestants must own and show their own animal, and it must be the animal they won with in their respective class.
- 3. Animals and contestants must be properly fitted for show.
- 4. Judging will be on the basis of the contestants' ability to present their animal for judging including the movement and positioning of the animal, condition and cleanliness of the animal as it relates to being ready for show. Judging will also be on the contestants' ability to present each of the animals in the contest to the judge including movement and positioning of the animal. Personal appearance, mannerisms

and conduct of the showman are included.

- 5. The same showmanship rules for regular showmanship classes shall apply to the Round Robin contest.
- 6. Time limits: 5 minutes on own animal, 3 minutes on each of the other animals. FFA must show respective FFA animal and 4-H must show respective 4-H animal.
- 7. Previous winners are ineligible for this contest in the category they have already won. They may show in another species.
- 8. The Round Robin Committee will meet with the contestants and judges one-half hour before contest.
- 9. The Large animal Round Robin Contest will follow the Beef Show on Friday afternoon.

### HERDSMANSHIP

The following Herdsmanship rules apply to both 4-H and FFA exhibitors. Club or Chapter names need to be on stall cards. Stalls will be assigned in club and chapter blocks.

### HERDSMANSHIP GENERAL RULES

- 1. Members <u>must</u> display poster or stall card with:
  - Exhibitor name
  - 4-H Club or FFA Chapter
  - Animal Identification
  - -Weights and/or hip height on market animals, **or**
  - Breed Information (birthdate, etc.) on breeding animals
  - -Class of Animal (market or breeding)

**NOTE**: The pens are judged on cleanliness, appearance of animals, sound husbandry practices. (Tack, stalls & trimming areas to be included in club/chapter identification.)

- 2. Scoring will start at the specified check- in time for each species, and continue through release time for each species.
- 3. Areas will be scored at random, and without prior knowledge by the exhibitor.
- 4. Overall Herdsmanship Award: To qualify for the over-all award, a club/chapter must have a minimum of three species. The highest three species total scores from each club/chapter will be used to determine overall herdsmanship.

The Crook County Jr. Leaders will have a Tim Crozier Memorial 4-H Herdsmanship Contest.

## FFA SHOWMANSHIP Department F Division 4

- 1. An eligible member may compete in both FFA and 4-H Showmanship contests provided livestock identified for the member's respective project work is shown.
- 2. Contestants may have no adult assistance in fitting livestock.
- 3. Judging will include generally accepted showmanship technique plus fitting.
- 4. Every contestant in showmanship shall be required to wear official FFA dress, except for Dairy, which will allow white pants (species specific).
- 5. Only the Champion Showman in each class is eligible for the Round Robin on Friday.)

- Preparation and showing of animals must be consistent with the Fitting Rules.
- 7. Special Species Rules:

- B. Youth Shows and 4-H Showmanship: Beef, Horse, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Dog and Cat.

- 2. All yearling bulls and older must be shown with a bull lead nose ring.
- 3. Market beef classes will be determined by weight. Release time for non-sale beef exhibits will be Friday at 5:00 PM. Market animals released upon completion of paperwork at the conclusion of the sale.
- 4. Market beef weigh-in is Tuesday, from 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm.
- 5. Any violation of the following rules will result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor in the Youth Beef Show. Further forfeiture of privileges and disciplinary action may be taken.
- 6. No use of any grooming material on an entry, that when rubbed with a glove or cloth, shows evidence of artificial color.
- 7. No use of any artificial tail head, or tail fin, artificial poll, or adding any hair or hair like substance.
- 8. No showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock. Unethical fitting is deemed to consist of any method which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's

body, or any animal having been operated on or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults or with the intent to deceive.

- 1. Possession date for Market Goats is June first
- 2. Market goats must be uniformly slick shorn with 3/8 inch of hair or less at the time of arrival on the fairgrounds. Legs may have hair up to the hock and knee only.
- 3. Market goats may be wethers or non-bred does.

- 4. Market goats are to have milk teeth in place or may have lost one or both of their milk teeth, but there shall be no evidence of breaking skin or eruption of the two permanent front teeth. If there is a question as to the age of a market goat being too old, it must be brought to the attention of the Market Goat Superintendent no later than 24 hours prior the show. The Market Superintendent will arrange to have the fair veterinarian determine the age of the goat by assessment of the teeth.
- 5. Market goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds, with no set upper weight limit. Underweight market goats will be allowed to show in a feeder class. No weigh-backs will be allowed.
- 6. A maximum of 3 classes, using natural or logical weight breaks, will be established by the Livestock Committee following the weigh-in.
- 7. Market goats must check in with the superintendent and all goats must have a USDA/APHIS Scrapies tag. All market goats will be checked for properly placed Wyoming State Fair designated ear tags.
- 8. Exhibitors are allowed to use halters or collars when showing their market goat.
- 9. The slapping or lifting of Market Goats in the show ring is not allowed. All goats must have four feet on the ground during the judge's inspection or handling. Lifting feet off the ground or placing feet on any support or altering ring surface is not Exhibitors will receive one acceptable. warning if they are found lifting or slapping goats. Second offense will result in exhibitor automatic and animal disqualification.

### YOUTH HORSE SHOW RULES

- 1. Entries open to Crook County exhibitors and horses enrolled in the 4-H or FFA project.
- 2. All policies of the current <u>Wyoming 4-H</u> <u>Equine Competition Guidelines Book</u> will apply unless superseded by specific rules herein.
- 3. All horse show entries are due at the fair office by the deadline stated in the Schedule of Events.
- 4. All entries need to be complete with contact information.

NOTE: If an exhibitor is showing more than one horse, please identify each horse and which class that horse will be shown in.

- 5. It is highly recommended that each horse have a current health inspection and vaccinations.
- 6. Upon arrival of the fairgrounds, ALL exhibitors must follow signage through check-in and vet check.
- 7. All 4-H exhibitors must be safety certified and endorsed by a certified 4-H leader designated by the Extension Office. Certification must be present at check-in.
- 8. All patterns are available to participants after entries are complete and will be posted the day of the show.
- 9. No more than two (2) entries per halter class by any one (1) exhibitor. No more than one (1) entry per performance class by any one exhibitor.
- 10. No horse may be shown in more than one halter class.
- 11. One (1) horse may only compete in each event, one (1) time per age group. Limit two (2) family members per horse.
- 12. The youth show will combine classes both 4-H and FFA will compete.
- 13. Each breed will be judged separate.
- 14. There will be NO STALLIONS allowed at the horse show.
- 15. Horses which cannot be controlled will not be allowed. Foals not being shown must be restrained outside the show ring.
- 16. Any other breed class is for purebred horses of breeding other than those specifically named. For example, a ¼ thoroughbred cross should be entered in the class that it most resembles, NOT ANY OTHER BREED.

NOTE: It is the exhibitor's responsibility to present crossbred or questionable animals to the Horse Committee PRIOR to the show. Unapproved entries may result in disqualification. All privileges will be forfeited and disciplinary action taken.

- 17. There will be three or more exhibitors in each class. Classes may be combined to complete the class. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 18. Exhibitors will get two calls before class is closed, participant will be disqualified if not in the arena.
- 19. Youth exhibitors showing an animal

- must do so without the aid of an adult.
  - a) Youth exhibitors are expected to fit and tend to their animals.
  - b) 4-H members may be assisted by others (members, parent, leader) when safety is a concern.
  - c) Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the helper is teaching the member a technique in fitting, showing, tack fitting and techniques.
  - d) When a participant needs assistance, they may receive help with tack and additional help with the horse prior to entering the arena. Including: assistance with the saddle, bridle and tack.
- 20. 4-H and FFA members are the only mounted riders allowed during the show.
- 21. **ATTIRE:** This attire shall apply to exhibitors in all halter and performance classes.
  - a) 4-H members shall wear appropriate attire including: hat, boots, long sleeved shirt or blouse with full length pants or member will be disqualified.
  - **b)** FFA members shall wear appropriate attire including long sleeve white shirt, hat, and FFA emblem or iacket.
  - c) Riders must wear smooth soled boots. Thick rubber soled and laceups will not be allowed.
- 22. **APPOINTMENTS:** The use of spurs, chaps or similar gear and the carrying of a rope or riata are optional.
- 23. Correct appointments are required in all English Classes.
- 24. Proper equipment must be used in all performance classes. The judge may inspect equipment as riders enter the class and allow exhibitor to correct equipment prior to the start of class judging. Lack of required appointments will be a cause for disqualification.
- 25. Please refer to WU Manual for detailed requirements.
- 26. All performance and showmanship classes will be divided by age. Effective as of January 1 of the current year:

- Cloverbuds (5-7 years of age)
- Juniors (8-10 years of age)
- Intermediate (11-13 years of age)
- Senior (14-18 years of age)
- 4-H (19+ years of age) NOT allowed FFA (21+ years of age) NOT allowed
- 27. Unsportsmanlike conduct from the exhibitor and/or parent will forfeit premiums, disqualification from the event and will be dismissed from the fairgrounds immediately.
- 28. Reminder Riding double or bareback will not be permitted.
- 29. State Fair Youth Horse Show entries will be at the discretion of the Horse Committee and 4-H Educator.
- 30. **STALLS:** Stalls are available first come first serve.
- 31. Exhibitors must provide their own feed.
- 32. Exhibitors are expected to prepare and clean stalls before departure.

# YOUTH RABBIT SHOW RULES All Rabbit Show entries must be recorded as a Crook County FFA or 4-H project.

- 1. Due to the rapid development of diseases in rabbits, health certificates are required. Any rabbit showing symptoms of disease shall be removed from the show area immediately.
- 2. Rabbits do not necessarily need to be pedigreed or registered or meet ARBA standards; however, exhibitors are encouraged to breed and show good quality individuals.
- 3. Due to small numbers, varieties in many

breeds will be shown together. There will be three or more exhibitors in a class; if not, classes will be combined until that number is reached.

- 4. If an animal is shown in a fur class it must have been shown in its respective breed class. Animals disqualified for reasons other than health may still show in the fur class. Fryer fur animals should be shown out of a meat pen only.
- 5. Rabbits entered as singles cannot compete in meat pens. Single rabbits are not eligible for the sale.
- 6. Exhibitors must provide their own feed, feeders, water, & water pans.
- Animals will be checked in as per Schedule of Events in the front of this book.
- 8. All rabbits are to be in possession, by June 1 of the current year, to be able to show at the county fair.
- 9. Release time for rabbit exhibits will be Friday at 5:00 pm.
- 10. While showing animals, 4-H exhibitors will be dressed in clean, full-length pants, long-sleeved shirt, boots or leather shoes. NO TENNIS SHOES OR SANDALS. No headgear. Dress code will be enforced by superintendents. FFA members will follow dress code for their chapter as set by their advisors.

- 1. Lambs entered in these classes may be either ewes or wethers. All market lambs must be totally slick shorn 10 days prior to the sheep show.
- 2. Classes will be established, following weigh-ins, using natural or logical weight breaks.
- 3. Market lambs must weigh a minimum of 100 pounds. Underweight lambs will be allowed to show in a feeder class. No weigh-backs allowed. Weight classes are ranked from lightest to heaviest. Champions and Reserve Champions from these categories will compete for Grand and

Reserve Champion Market Lamb.

- 4. The slapping or lifting of Market Lambs in the show ring is not allowed. All lambs must have four feet on the ground during the judge's inspection or handling. Lifting feet off the ground or placing feet on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping lambs. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor and animal disqualification.
- 5. Hair breeds such as Southdown/Dorper lambs must weigh a minimum of 85 pounds. 6. Speckled face lambs must show mottling of black and white color on the face and/or black spots/speckles on the face, ears, and legs below the knees and stifle joint. All market lambs must have their lamb teeth.
- 7. Any sheep showing signs of rectal prolapsed shall be disqualified and immediately removed from the fairgrounds.
- 8. Demonstration of fitting and grooming equipment will not be required nor judged. It is expected that the fitting, grooming, and preparation of the animal be done by the contestant and will be considered by the judge.
- 9. No artificial color, paint or powder is allowed on market sheep.

- 1. ELIGIBILITY OF FLEECES:
- (a) Each fleece entered must have been grown by a 4-H or FFA member and be from sheep recognized as part of current project work and have been shorn in the current or previous year. Last year's fleeces shown at last year's Fair are not eligible for this Fair.
- (b) Each fleece must represent not more than 12 months growth, except in the case of yearling fleeces, 16 months growth will be allowed.
- 2. FLEECE QUALITY: Any fleece entered in competition shall be discriminated against if:
- (a) Tied with other than paper twine
- (b) Showing any paint or tar brands (soluble branding fluids permissible)
- (c) Showing excessive dung locks or tags
- (d) Discolored by excessive moisture
- (e) Cotted
- (f) Showing a weak staple or break in fiber
- (g) Containing any excess burrs or other vegetable matter.
- 3. PREPARATION OF FLEECES: Spread out the fleece on a clean table or floor, skin side down, taking care not to pull or open fleece as it is handled. The fleece will look like a pelt or hide. At this stage, before rolling or tying, remove all heavy tags, stained wool, and obvious foreign matter. Rolling the fleece takes four easy steps: 1.) Begin at one side and loosely fold 8 to 10 inches of the edge toward the center of the fleece. 2.)

Do the same on the other side, but fold toward the center two times -until the twice folded portion lies on top of the first fold. 3.) Fold in the head wool. 4.) Roll the entire fleece from the breach toward the shoulder and long side wool. Fleece is now ready to be tied. Using paper fleece twine, wrap it in two directions and tie as you would a package. There should be no loose ends hanging from the fleece. It should be loose enough to make judging easy, yet compact enough to prevent it from falling apart when handled.

- 4. There shall not be more than two entries per class from one exhibitor.
- 5. The judging area is closed to everyone except Judge, Superintendent and Assistant to the Superintendent.

NOTE: All swine must be washed before being brought to the fairgrounds.

### All Swine Show entries must be recorded as a Crook County FFA or 4-H project.

- 1. Each breed judged separately.
- 2. Minimum age of four months for junior pigs.
- 3.Only Exhibitors, Judges, Superintendents and Clerks are allowed in the judging ring during any show.
- 4. All water and feed buckets MUST be SECURELY tied to prevent spills in pens. Shavings will be furnished.
- 5. All showmen to show swine with a cane, show stick or bat. Brushes are optional.
- 6. Swine must be inspected by the veterinarian before being unloaded or provide current health inspection papers.
- 7. All swine must be washed before they come to the fairgrounds and for weigh-in. This includes ear tags. Any swine not meeting this requirement will not be weighed.
- 8. Release time for non-sale swine exhibits will be Friday at 5:00 P.M.
- 9. All swine exhibited must be owned in the name of one individual member by June 1.
- 10. No oil or powders allowed on hogs. WATER ONLY.

### All Poultry Show entries must be recorded as a Crook County FFA or 4-H project.

Due to small numbers, varieties in many breeds will be shown together. There will be three or more exhibitors in a class; if not, classes will be combined until that number is reached.

- 1. Any sick or diseased bird nay not be allowed on grounds and/or be disqualified and must be removed from the grounds immediately.
- 2. A bird entered as a single can compete in a pen.
- Exhibitors must provide their own feed, feeders, waterers and cage hooks. (no padlocks)
- 4. Exhibitors must be present at judging time to present their animals to the judge.
- 5. Each exhibitor will be responsible for the cleanliness of their pens.
- 6. Meat pen of chickens must make grade as determined by the poultry Judge. If **ANY** chicken in a pen does not meet weight requirements, the meat pen is not eligible for the sale.
- 7. Poultry will be checked in as per Schedule of Events in the front of this book.
- 8. It is recommended that no poultry exhibits be more than 1 year old.
- 9. Poultry exhibits must be lice-free or they will be disqualified.
- 10. Market poultry is required to weigh a

- minimum of 3 ½ lbs., no maximum weight required.
- 11. Release time for non-sale poultry exhibits will be Friday at 5:00 p.m. If space is not available for Open Class poultry, they may be taken home when show is completed.

### **POCKET PETS**

- 1. Pocket Pets are considered to be any small rodent, bird, amphibian, reptile or any other special creature that an exhibitor has as a pet. Cats, dogs, cavies and rabbits are not eligible.
- 2. All pocket pets must be confined to an ESCAPE PROOF CAGE OR CONTAINER, suitable for that particular species, while they are on the fairgrounds.
- 3. Exhibitors must provide their own cages. It is the total responsibility of the exhibitor to provide for the welfare of the animal while at the County Fair.
- 4. Exhibitors may be asked to discuss and have knowledge of their pet and may be asked to handle their pet at the judge's discretion.
- 5. Any pet showing signs of illness will be removed from the grounds immediately at the discretion of the Superintendent
- 6. Jr. Exhibitor: Ages 13 years & under; Sr. Exhibitor is ages 14 years and older.

Exhibits in classes 9 to 10 cannot be the same as current Youth static exhibits.

7. The Champion Pocket Pet exhibitor shall be determined by most points accumulated in classes 1 to 8 AND classes 9 to 10. Points awarded as follows:  $1^{st}$  place received 4 pts through  $4^{th}$  place receiving 1 pt.

You may sell 1 pen of poultry, 1 market goat and 1 market sheep to total 3.

The Overall Champion and Overall Reserve Champion of Beef, Hogs, Lambs and Goats must sell at the Youth Livestock Sale unless owned by one exhibitor. Any other animal that makes weight and the above limits are not exceeded may sell at the sale.

A buyer must make arrangements BEFORE the sale if there are extenuating circumstances that require the seller to take the sale animals home after the Crook County Fair.

A seller can only sell in the youth sale until the summer after their high school graduation. Sheep, pigs and goats will be sold by the head. Beef will be sold by the pound. Meat poultry and meat rabbits will sell by the pen. No sale animal will leave the premises until the conclusion of the sale and all paperwork is completed.

**NO PRIVATE TREATY SALES**. This includes, but is not limited to, surplus market animals not eligible to be sold in the Youth Livestock Sale, or animals that did not make weight. Private treaty sales also include breeding animals and small animals and poultry. This rule is not to punish any exhibitor, but rather to uphold the integrity of the Youth Livestock Sale and allow each exhibitor a fair opportunity. Breeding livestock, small animals and poultry sales can take place after the Crook County Fair.

NOTE: <u>2% OF EACH ANIMAL SOLD WILL BE SUBTRACTED FROM THE TOTAL OF THE SALE!!</u> The 2% is used to help for advertisement so that each youth may get a good price per pound and per head.
